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Birth Control aka Contraception



Contraceptives Background

- "Contraception is crucial for helping women avoid unintended pregnancies, and it has myriad health, social and economic benefits"
- "Since the mid-1990s, 28 states have required health insurance plans regulated by the state that provide coverage of prescription drugs and devices to also cover prescription contraceptives"
- Under the Affordable Care Act of 2010, there is a federal contraceptive coverage guarantee that applies to most private health plans nationwide, which "specifically requires coverage for 18 methods of contraception used by women[...] along with related counseling and services, and it requires this coverage to be provided without any out-of-pocket costs to the patient"
- "29 states and the District of Columbia require insurers that cover prescription drugs to provide coverage of FDA-approved prescription contraceptive drugs and devices"

United States Facts

- 23% of women in need of publicly funded family planning services are uninsured
- 21 million of U.S. women ages 13-44 were likely in need of publicly supported contraceptive services and supplies in 2016
- 18 states (and DC) require emergency rooms to provide emergency contraception to sexual assault survivors

Birth Control Implant:

Low maintenance

- -99% effective
- -Can cost \$0 to \$1300
- -Lasts up to 5 years
- -A tiny metal rod that gets inserted into the arm and releases hormones into the body



IUD (Intrauterine Device):

- -Low maintenance
- -99% effective
- -Can cost \$0 to \$1300
- -Lasts up to 3-12 years
- -A tiny device that is put into your uterus
- -5 different brands: Paragard, Mirena, Kyleena, Liletta, Skyla



Birth Control Shot:

- -Used on a schedule 94% effective
- -Can cost \$0 to \$150
- -You get one every three months
- -A shot that contains the hormone progestin

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Birth Control Vaginal Ring:

- -Used on a schedule
- -91% effective
- -Can cost \$0 to \$200
- -Replace monthly
- -A ring that you wear inside your vagina that releases hormones into your body



Birth Control Patch:

- -Used on a schedule
- -91% effective
- -Can cost \$0 to \$150
- -Replace weekly
- -A patch that you wear on certain parts of your body that releases hormones through your skin

Birth Control Pill:

- -Used on a schedule
- -91% effective
- -Can cost \$0 to \$40
- -Take daily
- -A pack of pills that you take once daily

Condom:

- Use every time
- 85% effective
- Can cost \$0-\$2
- The ONLY birth control method that can protect against STDs and STIs
